Robert Heywood (1786-1868) was born into one of Bolton's prominent Unitarian families, which had interests in the Lancashire textile industry, trading as far afield as America, Gibraltar and the West Indies.

However, from the early 1820s, Heywood began to delegate control of his quilting business in order to concentrate his energies on local politics as a liberal reformer. Having lobbied successfully for Bolton to be granted borough status, Heywood was elected as the town's second mayor; and it was during this period of office (1839-1840) that he played a prominent role in tackling Chartist riots in the town. No. 1 (21 February 1936)-no. 222 (6 June 1940). This weekly newspaper was the organ of the British Union, or British Union of Fascists, the party founded by Oswald Mosley in October 1932.

The front page of no. 222 (6 June 1940), the last available issue, states: "We regret to announce that further detentions during the past week have deprived us of the services of more valued assistance in the production of 'Action'." This run appears therefore to be complete.

This newspaper is not to be confused with the earlier periodical of the same title published weekly by the anti-fascist New Movement between October and December of 1931 (ref. R17591).

18. Bethnal Green and Cable Street fascist newscuttings

National and local press cuttings, arranged chronologically, which document attempts to impede the progress of the marches organised by Sir Oswald Mosley's British Union of Fascists through London's East End, then home to much of the capital's Jewish community.

Initially a weekly, then a monthly, newspaper covering the period: February 1933-May 1939.

From 1 June 1934, it incorporated the short-lived periodical, *The Fascist week* (ref. D97596), and became styled under the title: "The official organ of the British Union of Fascists". Again in March 1938, it

changed to a monthly with the subtitle *British Union news*.

Edited and introduced by Dr David Renton, this recent publication contains a rich collection of memoirs, accounts, correspondence, etc., reflecting the tensions in Britain both for and against the wave of fascist as it spread through Europe in the politically turbulent 1930s.

Drawn from materials the archives of the Imperial War Museum in London, the collection includes the correspondence of Captain H.W. Luttmann-Johnson, one of the founders of the pro-Nazi 'January Club'. Also among the pro-fascist papers are William Joyce, the British Union of Fascists' Director of Propaganda, J. Macnab and R. Ling, as well as the manuscript of Margaret Heard's book, 'Stepping stones to Austria', describing her life as the wife of an interned half-German member of the BUF.

Starting as the Fascist bulletin (included here: vol. 2, no. 1-43; 13 June 1925-12 June 1926), it was continued as The British lion (no. 1-32; June 1926-November 1929), then finally as British Fascism (no. 1-23; June 1930-February 1933), with a special summer propaganda issue (June 1933) and an extra autumn issue (October 1933) and a further new series (no. 1-4; March-June 1934). The importance of events which occurred during the reigns of William & Mary and of Anne, between 1688 and 1714 cannot be denied, for it was during those years that the settlement which would dominate Britain throughout the eighteenth century was defined and refined. If the revolutionary years of the earlier seventeenth century had provoked brilliant ideas and the violent clash of interests, it was the years after 1688 in which was hammered out a workable settlement among them. It was also during the period in which Britain began to acquire a wealth

beyond belief and to develop the ability to spend lavishly, if not always tastefully. The complete series comprises some 30 theses selected by Dr. W. Reynolds McLeod, West Virginia University.

In 1812 he rejoined the army, serving in India and the Persian Gulf, including most notably, whilst political agent in Ra's al-Khaymah, leading an expedition in 1820 against the Beni Bou Ali tribe, for the failure of which he was court-martialled.

Already closely associated with Jeremy Bentham and other radical reformers, and on inheriting his father's fortune in 1828, Thompson turned his attentions to politics. Vociferous in his support for the Anti-Corn Law League and for the total abolition of slavery, he was returned to Parliament for the first time in 1835, only to lose to Benjamin Disraeli at the next election. Ten years later, after numerous intervening defeats, he was finally re-elected, this time as Liberal MP for Bradford.
